The first semester of the 2024-2025 school year has passed by so quickly! The career and technical (CTE) programs at our center have soared through the first half. The Career Development Center works with the local business community to enhance the courses offered through our center.

The CDC staff is committed to providing students with hands-on educational opportunities and work-based learning experiences. CTE courses help students develop marketable job skills and earn national industry certifications needed to achieve their occupational goals. In Mississippi, CTE courses are widely available. At more than 500 schools and 15 community and junior colleges, CTE instruction is offered in 49 distinct occupational areas.

Our vision is to provide students with the necessary skills to be college and career ready by instilling the importance of soft skills, pride, motivation, and character. We are moving towards that vision through the use of the ACT WorkKeys Assessment and national certifications in the areas of Business, Marketing, & Finance. The results of these assessments are included in the statewide accountability system. The ACT WorkKeys Assessment was administered to all CTE completers enrolled in year two of their chosen career pathways and to PHS seniors on November 19, 2024. National certification assessments are tested during the spring semester.


PRCC FTV Masterclass

ACT WorkKeys

CDC students worked hard preparing for the ACT WorkKeys test. Their goal is to perform silver, gold, or platinum, which earns them National Career Readiness Certification. WorkKeys is a nationally recognized test that measures skills required for success in the workplace, and helps to measure workplace skills in applied math, graphic literacy, and workplace documents. Local businesses that use the test for employment are MS National Guard, MS Power, Pearl River Valley Electric, Forrest General Hospital, Hattiesburg Clinic, Pearl River Community College, Coca-Cola Bottling, Brown Bottling, Gulf Coast Restaurant Group, The University of Southern MS, William Carey, Hancock Whitney Bank, and Poplarville School District. It can also increase the person's opportunities for workplace advancement.
